

Human greenhouse gas emissions and land-use affect energy flows in the atmosphere that raise temperatures and shifts precipitation, with many direct and indirect effects in the Sacramento Valley.

What might you do to take action to reduce reported climate risks living in the Sacramento area?

- Reduce energy dependency when possible (e.g. walk/bike vs. driving). Promote reduced fossil fuel use and switch to increased renewable energy sources (e.g. solar).
- Plant a tree (water wise) to shade your car or home.
 Promote urban tree canopy uses and reduced heat pollution.
- Review your household water consumption and waste sources. Implement a water conservation goal (e.g. 10%+) and storage plan, including stormwater capture for landscape use.
- Consider integrating climate adapting building materials in your home (e.g. **cool roof** to reduce heat gain).
- Use land responsibly and consider impacts of certain species to our ecosystem. Promote the control of invasive and non-native species to our land (and waters).
- Consider helping poor and disadvantaged communities impacted (e.g. at-risk heat and health sensitive groups).
- o **Be an advocate.** Engage 1+ friends, family members, neighbors, officials and government representatives to promote positive social and environmental practices and policies that reduce climate risk to *our* common home.

A general summary of climate risks facing the Sacramento Valley Region

- · Warming air and water temperatures
- More extreme heat-waves
- Drier landscapes
- Less snow
- Variable precipitation and seasonal shifts
- More intense droughts and floods with less predictability
- Higher Delta water levels compounded by subsidence
- Increased risk of wildfire
- · Loss of ecosystem habitat
